By email dated February 9, 2017, applicant was directed to furnish additional information pursuant to Regulation No. 54-04(b). The information concerned former WMATC Carrier No. 850, which applicant's president, Nagwa Hamad, controlled when it applied for voluntary termination of its WMATC authority in 2008. WMATC Order No. 11,309 approved termination and directed Carrier No. 850 to verify removal of all WMATC markings from its vehicle(s), but no verification was ever filed. The February 9, 2017, email issued in this proceeding gave applicant until February 23 to confirm whether said markings had been removed. The email cautioned applicant that failure to timely furnish the information would result in delay or dismissal of the application. Applicant has filed two affidavits in response, but neither addresses whether said markings were ever removed.

Under the Compact, an application to obtain a certificate of authority shall be made in writing, verified, and shall contain the information required by the application form and accompanying instructions.¹ An applicant may be required to publish notice of the application in a newspaper of general circulation in the Metropolitan District and furnish any supplemental information necessary for a full and fair determination of the application.² Failure to comply with the Commission's application requirements warrants dismissal.³

THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED: that the application of Amna Transit Services Inc. for a certificate of authority is hereby dismissed without prejudice for want of prosecution.
